#### **IRAQ CRISIS**

1. The Islamic State in Iraq and the Levant (alternatively translated as Islamic State in Iraq and Syria or, sometimes, "greater Syria" — using the Arabic word "Sham"), abbreviated as ISIL or ISIS, is a battle-tested, well-financed Jihadist Wahhabi army with advanced military leadership led by Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi.

- 2. ISIS has captured large areas of Iraqi territory in a lightening drive toward Baghdad.
- 3. "They have incredible command and control and they have a sophisticated reporting mechanism from the field that can relay tactics and directives up and down the line. They are well-financed, and they have big sources of manpower, not just the foreign fighters, but also prisoner escapees." Jessica Lewis Institute for the Study of War 4. ## Timeline 2014

JAN 3 - ISIS took the city of Fallujah, Iraq, and proclaimed an Islamic State of Iraq. ISIS controls large areas of the Iraqi Anbar desert bordering Syria.

JAN 8 – fierce house to house fighting in the cities of Aleppo and Raqqa Syria between ISIS and Syrian Rebels. Raqqa operates as ISIS's capital.

MAR – ISIS moves forces from Syria into Iraq


JUN 5 – Isis attacks the city of Samarra in Iraq

JUN 9 – ISIS takes the strategic city of Mosul, Iraq's 2d most populous city.

JUN 11 - ISIS takes Tikrit Iraq

JUN 12 – Iraqi Army abandons the oil city Kirkuk and the Iraqi Kurds take control of Kirkuk. Iraq's map is redrawn.



# Iran Intervenes in Iraq

- 1. The commander of Iran's Quds Force, Maj. Gen. Qasem Soleimani, went to Baghdad on June 9, 2014 to consult with the Iraqi government.
- 2. On June 13, Iran sent about 500 Revolutionary Guard troops to fight alongside Iraqi government security forces in Diyala province, a senior Iraqi security official in Baghdad told CNN.

#### **UKRAINE CRISIS**

- 1. Ukraine elected a new president, Petro Poroshenko, May 25, 2014.
- 2. Fighting in eastern Ukraine has intensified with casualties on both the Ukrainian and pro-Russian rebel sides.
- 3. On June 12, Russian forces infiltrated three T-64 tanks and rocket launchers into pro-rebel controlled territory in Ukraine and handed these over to pro-rebel forces



- 4. On June 14, pro-Rebel forces shot down a Ukrainian transport aircraft with surface to air missiles killing 49 Ukrainian soldiers.
- 5. On June 15, a Ukrainian mob threw stones and paint at the Russian embassy in Kyiv, Ukraine. The Voice of Russia called this attack a provocation for war.
- 6. On June 16, negotiations between Russia and Ukraine over the sale of gas failed and Russia cut off gas shipments to Ukraine.

#### **PAKISTAN CRISIS**

- 1. On 8 June, 10 heavily armed al Qaeda linked Taliban terrorists attacked the cargo terminal of Pakistan's international airport in Karachi, killing 26 people before the Pakistani Army killed all ten terrorists.
- 2. On 10 June, another terrorist attack near the airport occurred.
- 3. The Taliban terrorists were members of the Tehrik-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) that is based in the tribal areas of Waziristan, Pakistan.
- 4. On 15 June, the Pakistani military intensified air strikes in North Waziristan, and bombed eight foreign militant hideouts. At least 105 insurgents were reported killed,
- 5. On 16 June, the Pakistani Army launched an all-out ground and air offensive against the Taliban tribal areas in Waziristan.

# **Analysis**

- 1. IRAQ: The US fears an al Qaeda-ISIS takeover of Iraq, but is not willing to commit decisive military force to change the outcome. If the US gets involved militarily, it will most likely be too little, too late.
- 2. UKRAINE: The Russians are maneuvering to destabilize Ukraine. Russia is making deliberate moves to control Ukraine and limit US and EU influence. The US and EU will most likely not invest the money or power to deter Russia from having its way in Ukraine.
- 3. PAKISTAN: The Pakistani Army has launched a determined attack into the Taliban controlled tribal areas, but this has been attempted before and failed. Expect a bloody, long and difficult struggle.

# Analysis continued:

Commitment... it is all about who is more committed to success.

Anything we do in Iraq or Ukraine, or what Pakistan does in Waziristan, will only be successful if the actors are fully committed for the long haul. Air strikes are not decisive and show no commitment.

Who was more committed to success in the American Revolution: Great Britain or the Americans? Washington beat the British because he and his Continental Army were more committed to the war, and willing to fight for as long as it took to win, than were the British.

We have had forces in Germany, Japan and Korea since 1945. After WWII, the US was fully committed to ensuring the peace. We left in Vietnam and lost. We will leave in Iraq and Afghanistan. How can we expect a different outcome than what happened in Vietnam?

We are not committed to Iraq or the Ukraine, and Pakistan is not committed to stay in Waziristan. The prospects of success, therefore, are problematical.


